## Advent Gathering – December 4<sup>th</sup>



Welcome this season of Advent expectation and joy with our Annual Advent Gathering, Sunday, December 4<sup>th</sup>, following worship. Our celebration begins immediately following the worship service with a mini Advent organ recital by Michael Unger. He will perform Johann Sebastian Bach's *Six Schübler Chorales*, a published set of organ works from 1748/1749, late in Bach's life. These works are based on chorales which recent scholars have linked to texts sung during Advent when Bach was working in Leipzig in the middle of the eighteenth century. Beginning with his famous setting of *Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme* ("Wake, O

Wake"), each of the chorales are Bach's own transcriptions of cantata movements he composed earlier in his life. All are welcome!

A potluck lunch will follow the recital. And then it's on to crafts, music by the LYO kids, and carol singing. It will be a wonderful time for the entire family!

There is a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board in the hallway by the coat racks. Please sign up if you are planning to attend. Advent is a glorious season, and our gathering will be a wonderful way for everyone to join together to celebrate!

## Pastor's Corner

*“Look, the young woman is with child and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel” which means “God is with us.”*  
*Matthew 1:23*

Advent. The season of expectation and preparation. The season of light breaking through the darkness of our lives. The season of Emmanuel, God promising to be with us intimately and physically. What does it mean when we say that God draws near to us and is with us, is *our* Emmanuel? The following is an excerpt from the book, *Earthly Good: Seeing Heaven on Earth* by Martha Sterne, an Episcopal priest from Maryville, Tennessee. Perhaps the best way to see God in our midst is through our children's eyes.

“Where is God? was the question.

Where is God? she asked them, forty of the kids in our parish from eighteen months to sixteen years. Where is God? the painter asked. Tell me and we'll paint a chasuble for the priest to wear at the altar. Tell me where God is and we'll make a garment out of your telling, a garment fit to wear as we thank God for all our blessings. So tell me where God is.

They answered in crayon masterpieces and whispered stories and giggles and deep theology and even Play-doh. And they pointed to themselves, to each other, to their hearts and one two-year-old to the bottom of her shoes thus echoing Paul Tillich's acclaimed assessment that God is the ground of all being.

And they said, well, God's in our hills, so she drew the hills. And God's in the colors, so she drew them. And God's in the wind and the wind is hard to draw, but she drew it. And God's in the flowers and the sun and the moon. And they told her to remember the moon has different faces. One child said God is in the black holes in space, even there, and in the night and the day. And somebody said God's on Saturn, which is there somewhere on that chasuble, ringed in red.

And the glory of God, our children told us, is in the animals we love—our dogs and cats, our parrots, our ponies. Somebody said, well, don't forget God made pigs too. And woolly sheep. And in the wild. God's glory is in the wild in great apes and giraffes and butterflies and even a bat...

Two boys thought to themselves, we'll draw the animals that kill, the predators, and we just bet they won't get in this where-is-God thing. But when they took the fierce drawing to the painter, she said, oh, just what I need, just right, just so. For God's glory is in the fierceness of things—they already know that, our kids, so we don't have to deny fierceness. God's glory is even in death, in the cycle and circle of life and death and life again.

And (my personal favorite) there's a snake biting a hippopotamus on the bottom, and the hippo looks like he's squealing like mad. So God's in the sound of things also—our squeals of indignation and our songs and wistful murmurs and declarations of the heart. God is in it all, us all, for we are there too, on that chasuble, filled with the glory of God. Our children seem to know that we are part of the big, gracious and lively household of God.

And you know what else our children know? We are not at the center; we are just dancers in the dance. But we are the dancers who step outside the dance of creation and know, sing, paint, tell. We are the ones who step outside the dance and know the glory of God is shot through it all.

One of my parishioners told me that 'faith' had always been about doing one's duty and going to church and sitting through boring sermons and enduring pledge drives. And then one day—through the love of friends and the beauty of the world around us and the nourishment of the Body and the Blood—one day the realization came. My God, it's not me doing my duty that saves me, it's grace all over and around me—grace of God every breath, every taste, every touch. All this time 'faith' had meant being bored to death by religiosity; and instead, faith is about the glory of God dancing in all of creation. It's about the mighty grace of God relentlessly following us, leading us through life, in death, even beyond death to new life in Christ who draws creation to himself so that at the last we are, all of us, all there is, dwelling at peace in the glory of God.

So if you go to church to do your duty, forget it. The children know better. They know that the glory of God fills all of creation—the light and the dark, the gentle and the fierce, the air and the water, the cosmos and the microcosm. And that death is not the last word, glory be to God. The last word we have from God is Life. The tomb is not the end. The tomb is, in the end, finally empty. Creation dancing knows that. And we, who think we know so much and really know so little, through the grace of God in Christ Jesus, can know that too.

Just ask the kids.”

This wondrous season, join me in the dance of Advent, the dance of expectation and preparation, the dance of God With Us.

## Capital Campaign Update

As we approach the liturgical season of Advent, the season of active waiting and hopeful anticipation, we actively wait and anticipate the completion of phase one of our renovation projects here at 597 East Ave.

Recall that just two years ago, our grounds were torn up as drainage repairs and upgrades were undertaken. In the past eighteen months, our sanctuary roof has undergone a complete and total replacement. With all the necessary demolition, it was hard to imagine that our grounds would ever return to the pristine beauty for which they had been known for so many years.

And if that were not enough, just this past spring, the inside renovation phase began. Weeks upon long weeks of asbestos abatement and ensuing abatement complications put everyone's patience to the test. But even that phase thankfully came to an end.

Since the end of August, renovations to our narthexes, kitchen and Sunday School spaces have progressed to the point where finishing touches are now being applied and a time to celebrate and dedicate those spaces is in sight. Though the professionals of Frank J. Marianacci Inc. and Bero Architecture have been flawless in their work with us, we are tremendously indebted to the vast number of Incarnate Word volunteers, affectionately known as the "Sweat Equity Team". Never in the history of our congregation, have so many come out and given so much of their time all at once. The fantastic Sweat Equity Team was

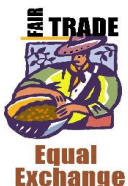

# The Community Arts Academy

The Community Arts Academy is celebrating its TENTH anniversary on June 7, 2012. We are very excited that CAA has offered opportunities for school-age students in the city of Rochester to explore the arts in a variety of after-school activities. Eight of our students have gone on to the School of the Arts. In our 10 years, our student population has gone up and down – we began with 10 students – and the economy has certainly gone up and down.

The county is no longer providing reimbursements to low-income families for child-care. This year in particular, we have had many requests for scholarships, which we have tried to honor. These scholarships maintain our diversity, but also require additional funding for their support.

CAA has applied to the Fred and Floy Willmott Foundation for **Matching Funds** for up to \$3,000 for our Annual Fund. Last year we raised 90% of our \$3,000 goal. Your investment, large or small will help us reach that goal this year.

A huge thank you to the Lutheran Church of the Incarnate Word for all you encouragement and support. We hope you will mark you calendars and plan to join us for our Spring Fling on June 7 as we celebrate our 10 years of operation.

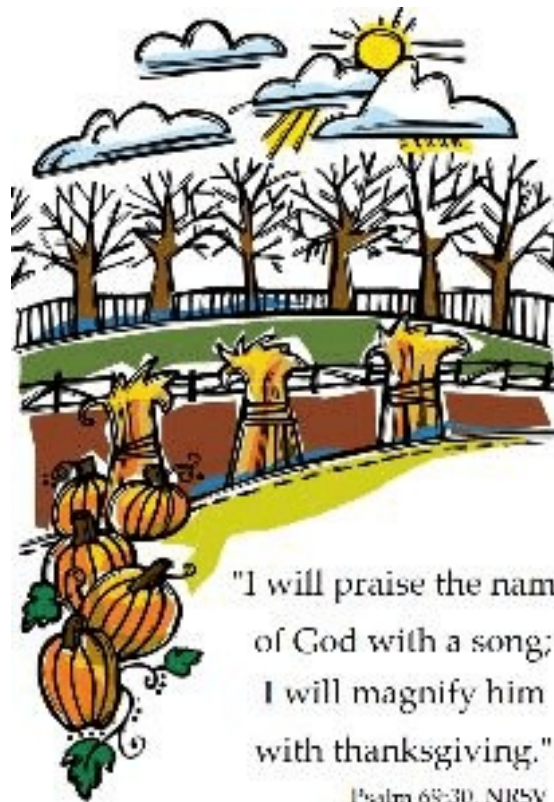
